North Carolina Museum of Art Opens Reimagined Galleries and Special Exhibition A Modern Vision: European Masterworks from The Phillips Collection with Weekend of Free Celebrations

Raleigh, NC—The North Carolina Museum of Art will open its newly reimagined collection galleries alongside special exhibition <u>A Modern Vision: European Masterworks from The Phillips Collection</u> on Saturday and Sunday, October 8 and 9, with an exciting lineup of free related events presented with opening partner Bank of America.

"We are thrilled to welcome visitors to a completely reimagined presentation of the People's Collection, which we rededicate to the people of North Carolina," said NCMA Director Valerie Hillings. "The updated collection galleries showcase broader representation and fresh perspectives through new works of art, interactive installations, and thematic galleries. Visitors will also get to experience another incredible collection through special exhibition *A Modern Vision: European Masterworks from The Phillips Collection*, which brings great artists like Vincent van Gogh, Claude Monet, Pablo Picasso, and more to Raleigh."

The celebrations kick off Friday night, October 7, with the NC Artists Party, featuring music and dancing. The Museum then welcomes community members to its free Saturday ReMixed Block Party, including artistled gallery tours, family activities, music, dance, and poetry in the galleries, Monster Drawing Rally, and the Music at the Museum Festival presented with Come Hear NC. On Sunday the galleries will be filled with jazz music, dance performances, and new works by artists Stacey Kirby, Elizabeth Alexander, and JP Jermaine



Powell, as well as a free lecture featuring collection artists Leonardo Drew and Ursula von Rydingsvard.

On October 8 and 9, *A Modern Vision* will also be open and free to visit. Opening alongside the historic reinstallation of the People's Collection, the exhibition showcases extraordinary paintings by titans of impressionism, postimpressionism, expressionism, and cubism, carefully collected by founder Duncan Phillips for America's first museum of modern art, The Phillips Collection. Featuring more than 50 paintings by iconic artists including Edgar Degas, Edouard Manet, and Paul Cézanne from the world-renowned Phillips Collection, it brings to Raleigh artists famous for their depictions of light, color, and modern life. *A Modern Vision* will be on view through January 22, 2023, and tickets are available at <u>ncartmuseum.org/modernvision</u>.

Phillips Collection Studio Project: Peter Marin

This six-session course gives students guided immersion in <u>A Modern Vision: European Masterworks</u> <u>from the Phillips Collection</u> with artist Peter Marin as he teaches history and methods from Van Gogh to Picasso, Modigliani to Degas. Students create weekly work based on the ideas explored in the exhibition and works on view in the NCMA's collection. The course is in person and includes two days of gallery lectures and four days of studio time.

The event includes music, fashion, art sales, live performances, and the opening reception of the college exhibition *Thinking through Making*.

A Modern Vision joins two other special exhibitions on view this fall, <u>Start Talking: Fischer/Shull</u> <u>Collection of Contemporary Art</u>, open September 17, 2022, to February 5, 2023, and <u>Powers Concealed:</u> <u>Eqúngúns from Africa and America</u>, on view October 15, 2022, to February 26, 2023.

Start Talking features more than 40 works, including photographs, paintings, mixed-media assemblages, and sculptures, from a promised gift by collectors Hedy Fischer and Randy Shull of more than 100 works of contemporary art. Artists include Abraham Cruzvillegas, Vanessa German, Trenton Doyle Hancock, Graciela Iturbide, Pope.L, Tina Modotti, Gabriel Rico, Alison Saar, Betye Saar, Hank Willis Thomas, Nari Ward, and more. Based in Asheville, NC, and Merida, Mexico, Fischer and Shull have built an ambitious collection of works by artists who challenge the status quo and diverge from dominant historical perspectives on identity, power, resistance, and agency. They have focused on women and Black and Latin American artists, collecting art that, in their words, "has something to say."

In *Powers Concealed* the NCMA extends its global outlook to Africa, presenting an exhibition on African and African-inspired masquerade that features two contemporary *egúngún* ensembles from the United States—one newly commissioned—in conversation with a historic example from 1930s Nigeria from the NCMA's collection. *Egúngún*, meaning "powers concealed," refers to both the masquerade itself and the

idea that these masquerades are visible manifestations of departed African ancestors who visit earthside for blessings, celebrations, and remembrance.

About the North Carolina Museum of Art

The North Carolina Museum of Art's collection spans more than 5,000 years, from antiquity to the present, making the institution one of the premier art museums in the South. The Museum's collection provides educational, aesthetic, intellectual, and cultural experiences for the citizens of North Carolina and beyond. The 164-acre Museum Park showcases the connection between art and nature through site-specific works of environmental art including North Carolina artist Thomas Sayre's *Gyre* (1999), the inspiration behind the NCMA logo mark. The Museum offers changing special exhibitions, classes, lectures, family activities, films, and concerts.

The Museum is located at 2110 Blue Ridge Road in Raleigh and is home to the People's Collection. It is the art museum of the State of North Carolina, under the auspices of Governor Roy Cooper; an agency of the Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, guided by the direction of Secretary D. Reid Wilson; and led by Director Valerie Hillings.
